## Welcome from the Chairman

I am pleased to introduce our 2022 Review which covers a year of transformation for our children's hospice partners and for ourselves.

In March 2022 our Chief Executive for over sixteen years Simone Enefer-Doy retired and I begin by recording our appreciation of her devoted service and tireless efforts. She left a strong foundation on which our Trustees and new Chief Executive Rob Lightfoot are building as we review our mission and strategy while continuing to deliver our core objective.



During the year we have installed new technology packages and provided training for hospice staff at thirteen children's hospices across the British Isles. The continued success of any organisation, including Charities, depends on the capability to continually review, adapt and change to meet the challenges of a changing world. This we refer to as organisational agility and sadly we see many organisations which are failing because they do not have sufficient agility. By contrast I am proud to report that Lifelites has been able to adapt and change by developing, sourcing and installing different or improved technology and equipment packages and by offering our hospice staff training, annual conference and other services online.

We have come a long way since we began life as the millennium project of the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and believing in the "power of partnership" we now work with many other organisations and people. Some ten thousand children with life limiting conditions together with their families currently benefit from our magical technology and equipment, but there are many more who need and deserve our support. We want to be able to bring joy and unforgettable moments to them also, but we can only do this if we increase our funding. If you are a one of our donors or volunteers, I extend our heartfelt thanks for your valued and hopefully continuing contribution. 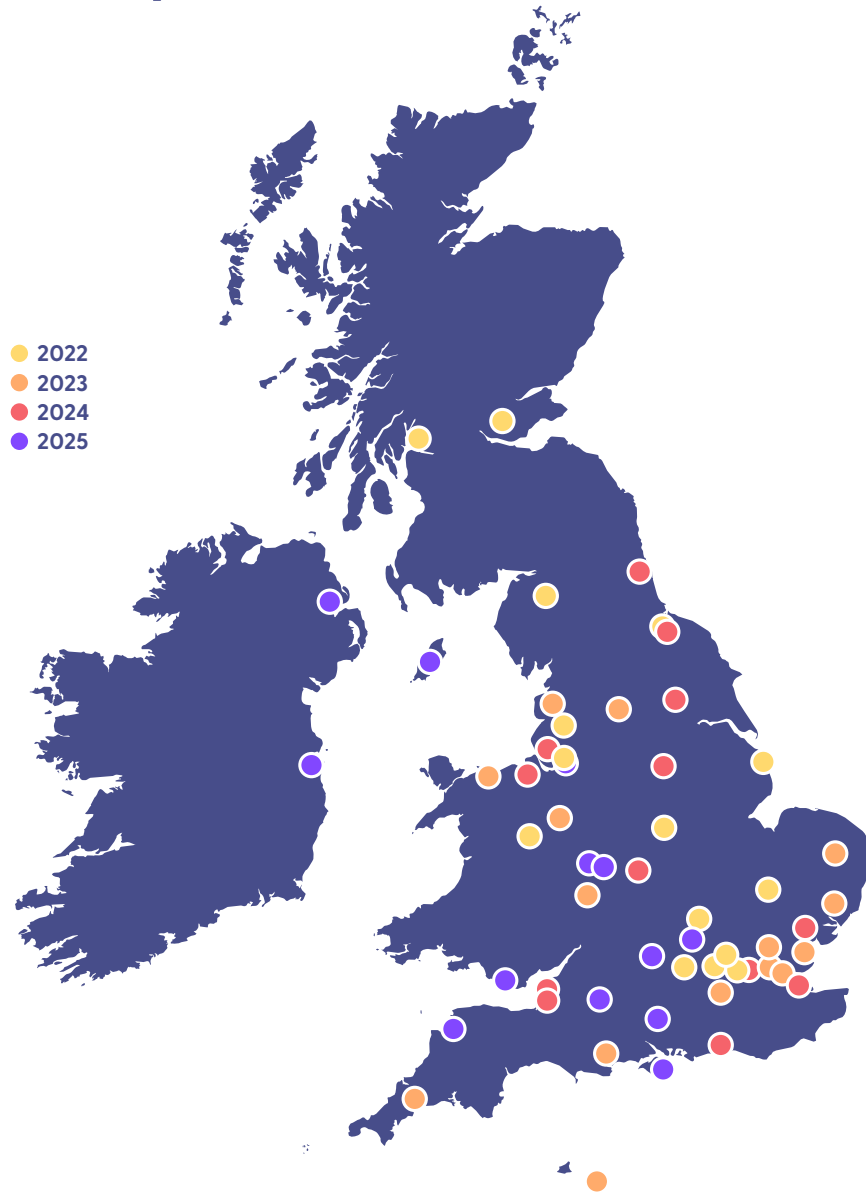

Firstly, we remain committed to delivering our core objective; enhancing the lives of children and young people with life-limiting conditions through the power of technology. However, we know their world is changing at pace. So we need to work with our partners to better understand the increasing demands on palliative care services and the growing complexity of need faced by the children and families we support. Through this, we will identify gaps and innovative service development opportunities to increase our impact further in this changing landscape.



Alongside this work, we want to identify opportunities to expand our reach. We are proud to say that over 10,000 children can access our services through children's hospices each year. However, our partners at Together for Short Lives estimate that there are 99,000 children in the UK with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions. It has long been an aspiration of Lifelites to support more children. To that end, we will be looking at opportunities to extend beyond children's hospices and develop new ways to increase our reach.

To enable these mission-led ambitions, we know we need to evolve, modernise and invest in our people, our governance, our fundraising and our brand. You will notice, in particular, that we have already updated our branding to reflect our vibrant, high-impact services. Development in these enabling foundations will serve us well as we seek to increase our reach and our impact. To bring this all into focus, we will be developing a robust, goal-focused strategic plan to set the tone and direction of travel for the coming years.

Ultimately, we believe every child with a life-limiting condition should be able to engage and interact with the people they love and enjoy the world they live in. We are under no illusions that there is a lot of work to do but we are confident that, together with our partners, we can continue Lifelites' extraordinary story.

# Lifelites responds to an urgent request for support

When we recently reached out to Lifelites with an urgent request, we were blown away by the charity's response. The request was from a family facing a critical and deteriorating period in their child's condition, they knew how much pleasure and the benefit the equipment gave.

The Lifelites team understood the critical timing and reacted swiftly. Even though it was on a weekend, Rob Lightfoot, Lifelites' CEO, personally collected the assistive technology that was needed from their London office and drove it to our hospice in Maidenhead to meet me. His actions, along with his team's, meant that this family was able to quickly access the technology to help their child at a crucial time, it enabled quality of life to be maintained, the child to feel they still had some independence and the ability to express themselves.

## In an exclusive interview Dom Shaw, Equality, Diversity & Inclusion Coordinator at Ukie and long-time supporter of Lifelites, shares why gaming inclusivity is vital.

**Lifelites: Dom, you've been supporting Lifelites for a long time now, how did you come to hear about Lifelites work and why did it resonate with you?**

**Dom:** I've known about the charity for almost a decade now. I actually discovered Lifelites through the university I attended for my undergraduate degree, London South Bank. Lifelites partnered up with the university to deliver a module in my final year called Tangible Play, which was all about learning and considering accessibility in games, featured special guest lecturers like Ian Hamilton, and for the final project of this work we had to create a one button game prototype that was tested at one of the hospices Lifelites worked with. This module not only expanded my perspective on how games could be used to interact with other people, it also started a real passion in me for inclusion, and a great respect for those that advocate and strive for greater accessibility throughout the games industry – including Lifelites.

**Lifelites: Inclusivity is a word that we hear in lots of different contexts. What does inclusivity mean to you and how do games help to represent this?**

**Dom:** I guess for the context of games in this conversation inclusivity means making sure everyone has the opportunity to get involved, everyone is welcomed to engage and that there is space for all to work, play and feel safe. That not only means giving players wonderful worlds to explore and diverse characters to interact with, it's also about making sure people are not excluded both in and outside of the game (e.g. Can see characters with similar representation to them or can play an online match to a multiplayer game comfortably), alongside having choices and options to how they play games and engage with industry.

**Lifelites: Why is gaming so important?**

**Dom:** Everyone regardless of age likes to have fun and play – video games can fulfill this to a T. Yet they are more than just a form of entertainment – they can allow a kid to unwind from a long day of school and/or studies. Live their wildest dreams on a rainy day when they can't go out. Compete with friends on a level playing field or connect with friends regardless of distance. Yet most importantly of all in this instance, games can empower and give control to kids on how they play, what they interact with and how they feel; all the while in the comfort of their home or some form of safe space that can be created through gaming being present. Which is why Lifelites' work is so important because they are assisting some of the most isolated children to discover these possibilities through video games and assistive technologies every day to make their lives happier!

**Lifelites: Thanks to people like you, Lifelites has had increasing support from the gaming industry and individual gamers too. What would you say to those who haven't heard of Lifelites before, why should the gaming industry want to support our work?**

**Dom:** Those that haven't heard about Lifelites before – I would simply tell them about the great work the charity has done. As for why the industry should support the charity – simply, because it is making a difference for children and young people who really appreciate it, the impact gaming has on them is truly life changing. The gaming industry can be a force for good and create magical moments for many young people. We just need to do less theory and more action while ensuring we lead with inclusivity at the forefront always to ensure everyone is thought of and in turn included along the way!

## Lifelites Live: Taking Virtual Reality across the country

**Lifelites campaign with Freemasons across the country to build partnerships in support of children using every hospice service.**

In March, our Lifelites Live campaign involved working with Freemasons from across the British Isles to support children with life-limiting conditions in their area.

Lifelites held photoshoots across the country with Freemasons from eleven Provinces and the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association at iconic locations including Hereford Cathedral, Ironbridge in Shropshire, Lake Windermere, and of course the United Grand Lodge of England. The aim was to support children using hospice services through the use of life-changing technology.



Virtual Reality (VR) is one item of technology that Lifelites donates to give children at every children's hospice across the British Isles the chance to walk along virtual beaches, or explore other countries or other worlds. The photoshoots also served to highlight the ongoing support of Freemasons in many parts of the country for Lifelites work in their area. Many Provinces have recently signed up to become Platinum Partners and support Lifelites work each year for the next four years. This will help to ensure that Lifelites can give ongoing access to life-changing technology for the children with life-limiting conditions accessing hospice services in their area.

This event saw the handover of Lifelites from retiring CEO Simone Enefer-Doy and new CEO Rob Lightfoot.

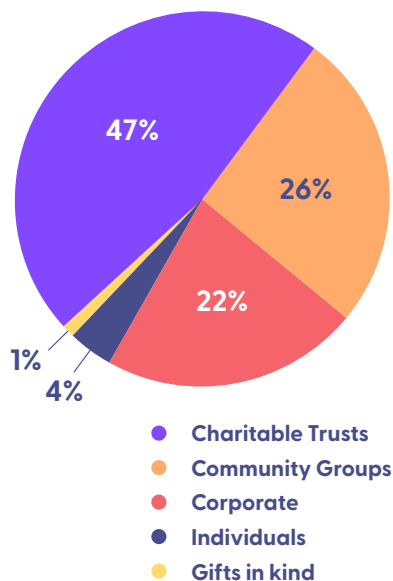

# Donation and expenditure breakdown 2021/22

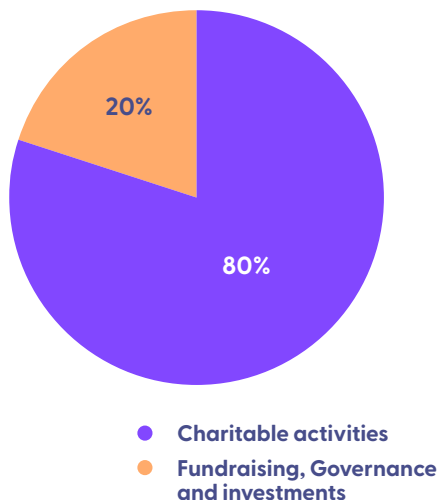
## Donations
